Do you think like a Christian?

Fewer than one in four Americans (24%) now believe the Bible is "the actual word of God, and is to be taken literally, word for word," similar to the 26% who view it as "a book of fables, legends, history and moral precepts recorded by man." This is the first time in Gallup's four-decade trend that biblical literalism has not surpassed biblical skepticism. Meanwhile, about half of Americans -- a proportion largely unchanged over the years -- fall in the middle, saying the Bible is the inspired word of God but that not all of it should be taken literally. A few hundred years after Jesus' resurrection, a man named Augustine found himself sucked into a cult called the **Manichaeans**, who believed in Jesus, used Scripture to support their doctrines, and claimed their founder was the "Spirit of truth" Jesus promised would come after He ascended into heaven. Although Augustine was raised by a devout Christian mother, he became dazzled by the new and exciting promises that put a fresh spin on the Christianity he grew up with. It probably didn't hurt that their beliefs permitted him to sleep with his girlfriend while pursuing his theological studies and perfecting his spiritual mind.

The Manichaeans believed that the teachings of Jesus were incomplete and that they had revelations that would usher in true religion for everyone. In this way, they believed religion could progress beyond what was revealed in Scripture. In order to defend these ideas, Faustus wrote against the reliability of the Bible. He would twist, re-interpret, or omit the parts of Scripture that didn't line up with Manichaean thought.

After Augustine's conversion to Christianity, he wrote a fairly comprehensive response to Faustus' attack on the authorship of the gospels. He wrote: "You ought to say plainly that you do not believe the gospel of Christ. For to believe what you please, and not to believe what you please, is to believe yourselves and not the gospel."

Back in the early 2000s, some Christian leaders got together to attempt to adapt Christianity to the post-modern mindset that was beginning to pervade culture. They were re-examining the methods the church had been using to reach the world and questioning some of the more legalistic, hypocritical, and downright cheesy elements of modern evangelicalism.

As the **Emergents** distanced themselves from a Christianity defined by beliefs and creeds, this different version of faith gained popularity among those **disillusioned** and **disenfranchised** by evangelicalism. This birthed "A New Kind of Christianity," which titled Brian McLaren's 2010 book.

Modernism is another philosophical movement that was prominent throughout the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

Postmodernism is a philosophical movement that impacted the arts and critical thinking throughout the latter half of the 20th century. Works in Postmodernism tend to have an attitude of rejection or irony toward typically-accepted narratives.

Postmodernism typically criticizes long-held beliefs regarding objective reality, value systems, human nature, and social progress, among other things.

Then Paul left Athens and went to **Corinth**. There he became acquainted with a Jew named Aquila, born in Pontus, who had recently arrived from Italy with his wife, Priscilla. They had left Italy when Claudius Caesar deported all Jews from Rome. Paul lived and worked with them, for they were **tentmakers** just as he was. Acts 18:1-3

Each Sabbath found Paul at the synagogue, trying to convince the Jews and Greeks alike. Vs 4

But when they **opposed** and **insulted** him, Paul shook the dust from his clothes and said, "Your blood is upon your own heads—I am innocent. From now on I will go preach to the **Gentiles**." Vs 6

One night the Lord spoke to Paul in a vision and told him, "Don't be afraid! Speak out! Don't be silent! For I am with you, and no one will attack and harm you, for many people in this city belong to me." So Paul stayed there for the next year and a half, teaching the word of God. Vs 9-11

In the Apostle Paul's day, Corinth had several nicknames. It was known as **Carnal Corinth, Sin City, or Vanity Fair**. To "corinthianize" a person was to **corrupt** a person. It was to take him beyond his **moral limits**. People went to Corinth to be corinthianized – it was like a rite of passage. There was no greater insult that could be given a woman than to be called a Corinthian. Julie Edensor

Recent excavations have uncovered over thirty-three wine shops located in downtown Corinth. The wine shops featured lofted rooms. Travelers would get drunk with wine and then enticed into these lofts for illicit activity with prostitutes and other partygoers.

Aelian, the late Greek writer, tells us that if ever a Corinthian was shown upon the stage in a Greek play he was shown drunk

Greek proverb, 'It is not every man who can afford a journey to Corinth.'

"Korinthos, there, on account of the multitude of **courtesans**, who were sacred to Aphrodite, outsiders resorted in great numbers and kept holiday. And the **merchants and soldiers** who went there squandered all their money so that the following proverb arose in reference to them: 'Not for every man is the voyage to Korinthos." Strabo, 20 AD, Geography 12. 4. 36

"Guest-loving girls [courtesans and prostitutes]! Servants of Peitho (Suasion) in wealthy Korinthos! Ye that burn the golden tears of fresh frankincense, full often soaring upward in your **souls** unto Aphrodite." Pindar, Eulogies Fragment 122

Strabo also tells us that "the 1,000 prostitutes were donated to the temple". This means that wealthy citizens donated their slaves to the temple of Aphrodite.
